The institution follows the academic calendar issued by the University of Kerala in order to successfully execute the syllabi of various UG and PG courses and prepare the students well in advance for their end semester examination conducted by the University of Kerala. Apart from the University academic calendar, institutional academic calendars for both UG and PG courses, are also prepared. This academic calendar helps the teachers to finish their allotted portions on time, anticipating delays due to regional problems and college specific activities. Heads of all the departments make sure that departmental academic activities are completed as per the academic calendar. Thus the institutional academic calendar ensures the timely conduct of internal examinations, submission and evaluation of assignments and projects, evaluation of seminars and internal exam answer scripts, consolidation of attendance, preparation of continuous evaluation (CE) sheets, verification of the CE marks by the students, redressal of grievances related to CE marks if any and entry of CE marks to the University website well before the due date. In addition to this, College Council meetings, general staff meetings and departmental staff meetings are held to plan, monitor and evaluate teaching - learning process. Various issues related to portion completion, examination, internal assessment, examination results, attendance system, timetable, extension activities and seminars are discussed during these meetings. Departments are asked to submit action plans at the beginning of every academic year and departmental activity reports collected at the end of every academic year. Departments are asked to analyse the end semester results of their students. IQAC closely monitors these activities and offers suggestions and feedback, if any.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>Feedback of stakeholders is considered to be of great importance for the smooth functioning of the institutional mechanism. Feedback is regularly collected from parents and students. Feedback forms are given to students every year to rate the institution and its faculty. The IQAC monitors the process, evaluates and consolidates the scores given to various faculty members under various criteria. The consolidated scores will be then conveyed to respective teachers through Principal. The Principal may brief the teachers on the kind of feedback they received. The teachers are expected to make necessary changes in their approach as per the feedback given to them. Parental feedback is collected during departmental parents' meeting and through Parent Teacher Association meeting. Parents are invited well in advance for these meetings. PTA meetings offer a strong platform for parents to give their concerns and suggestions. As per the feedback received from such meetings, the institution successfully banned the use of mobile phones within the campus/ classrooms during class hours. The decision to inform the parents about the attendance shortage of their wards was the result of parental feedback. Other stakeholders are encouraged to approach college principal and teachers to offer their feedback through formally or informally.</p>

Mentoring systems at various levels are available to students. The institution follows tutorial system in which

every batch of students will come under one tutor (a teacher from their home department) for their entire period of study. The tutor will be acquainted with personal background of his or her wards and maintain a tutorial record containing the academic, personal, social and economic background of the student. The tutor will supervise and consolidate CE records of the students. Tutors are encouraged to maintain close bonds with their wards so that the students can confide in them in the case of any difficult situation. Tutors are expected to contribute towards cultivating adaptability, positive attitude, personal awareness, confidence and self motivation among their wards.

The college also makes use of programmes like Walk With A Scholar (WWS) and Scholar Support Program (SSP). These two programmes are sponsored by the Higher Education Council, Government of Kerala. While WWS programme caters to students with excellent academic records, SSP targets slow learners. Students are provided with internal mentors (teachers within the college interested in student mentoring). They are also given external mentoring sessions by eminent personalities from various fields.

Apart from the University academic calendar, an institutional academic calendar is also prepared. This academic calendar helps the teachers to finish their allotted portions on time, anticipating delays due to regional problems and college specific activities. It also ensures the timely conduct of internal examinations, submission and evaluation of assignments and projects, evaluation of internal exam answer scripts, consolidation of attendance, preparation of continuous evaluation (CE) sheets, verification of the CE marks by the students, redressal of grievances related to CE marks if any and entry of CE marks to the University website well before the due date. Student's attendance is consolidated at the end of every month and the attendance status is displayed on department notice board. This helps students to keep track of their attendance and gives them ample time to make up attendance shortage, if any. Parents are also informed of attendance shortage and academic performance of their wards. In addition to internal exams, monthly class tests are conducted every month. Weak students are identified. A special programme called "Class @ Nine" is executed to provide more academic support and mentoring these students. Students are offered additional classes from 9.00 A.M. to 9.45 A.M. on week days.

Faculty members are encouraged to avail Faculty Development Programmes for career enrichment. Two of the faculty members received FLAIR Fellowships of the Department of Collegiate education. Two faculty members were awarded Doctoral Degree. Students and faculty members are also encouraged to participate in workshops and seminars to familiarize with the state of art technology and information related to their discipline. Department of Zoology is an approved research centre of the University. One of the faculty member of the department was approved as research guide by the university. A faculty member received the Best poster presentation award at the International Conference on Multidisciplinary Research held at St. Albert's college, Ernakulam

WiFi connectivity is provided in the college. There are three full fledged computer labs. There is a research laboratory attached with the Department of Zoology. DSTFIST has sanctioned an amount of Rs. 1.10 crores toward enhancement of facilities for teaching and Research. Amount of Rs. 92 lakhs was spent towards procurement of instruments under the scheme. RUSA has sanctioned an amount of RS. 2 crores for purchase, renovation and construction. Digital Seminar hall was renovated. A new volley ball court for

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. LITERACY PROGRAMME FOR MIGRANT LABOURERS (CHANGATHI): 'Changathi' programme was a project implemented under the auspices of the Kerala State Literacy Mission to teach migrant labourers the language and culture of Kerala and thereby improve their lifestyle. Though migrant labourers have become an important component in our societies doing many different types of jobs, there exists discrimination in the attitude of local people. By imparting the culture of Kerala and teaching Malayalam, the project aimed at reducing the discrimination and improve their ways of living. The Project in Alappuzha district was implemented in Mannancherry Grama Panchayath where considerable numbers of migrant labourers reside and work in many companies and shops. The project was implemented in association with our NSS units. Initially a survey was undertaken in 23 wards to identify the number and status of migrant labourer population in the panchayath. After consolidation of survey report and identification of those interested in attending the classes, 20 volunteers were allotted as instructors in different parts of Mannancherry Panchayath to teach the labourers. The textbook "Hamaari Malayalam" which has lessons comprising Malayalam alphabets, common terms to communicate at different circumstances,

need of cleanliness, festivals of Kerala etc, was used to teach migrant labourers . Orientation to NSS volunteers: An orientation class was conducted for the volunteers to get acquainted with the survey form. The Alappuzha District Coordinator of Literacy Mission, Sri.K.V.Retheesh elaborated the details included in the survey form and clarified the doubts of our volunteers. Orientation was conducted at Mannancherry Panchayath Hall and 85 volunteers participated in the meeting. Inauguration of the project and survey: An official inauguration of the programme was done by Panchayath President Sri. G. Venugopal. District Panchayath Member P.A. Jumailath presided over the programme and Coordinator of Literacy Mission Sri. K. V. Retheesh introduced the project. After the brief meeting, volunteers segregated into batches of 3, accompanied by a member from Kudumbasree conducted survey at 23 wards. Survey ended at 4.00pm. After completion of the survey and feedback, forms were handed over to the NSS office for consolidation. 81 volunteers took part in the survey. Consolidation of the survey forms and report preparation: Consolidation and report preparation was done by the Programme Officers with the help of volunteers and the data was submitted to the District Literacy Mission for publication. A total of 296 migrant labourers were identified from Mannancherry Panchayath. A total of 275 workers were identified for the literacy programme and classes were planned at 19 centres in Mannancherry Panchayath. Orientation to familiarize textbook: An orientation was conducted for 20 NSS volunteers who were selected as instructors to engage literacy classes. The programme was inaugurated by Mannancherry Panchayath President. Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator of Literacy Mission took classes on the textbook "Hamaari Malayalam". Induction of migrant workers to the literacy programme: Induction programme of migrant labourers to Changathi Programme was held at V.K.C Company, Valavanadu The programme was inaugurated by the Finance Minister Dr. T. M. Thomas Isaac. Literacy Classes: Classes began on 4th February after the induction of workers to the programme. Thereafter, classes are conducted every Sunday for 2 hours at the place of work or the residence of workers. Classes are mainly held at VKC company and at different places in the Panchayath. Digital classes were also conducted and tutorials were provided via mobile phones so that the learners could practice writing of Malayalam letters and words during leisure time. Classes were conducted till the middle of November 2018. Examination for learners: At the end of the learning process, an examination was conducted at different centres simultaneously on 25th November 2018 to assess the level of learning among migrant labourers. Question paper set by the Literacy Mission was provided for evaluation. The programme named "Mikavutsavam" was inaugurated by the Honorable Finance Minister Dr. T.M. Thomas Isaac. 145 learners wrote the examination. Certificates were also issued to the learners based on the participation in the programme and performance in the examination.

2. FLOOD RELIEF ACTIVITIES BY THE COLLEGE Alappuzha was one among the worst affected districts in our state, by unprecedented floods that occurred during July and August 2018. Being a college situated in the district, different activities were carried out for about three months period during the initial flood in July and the second devastating flood in August. During flooding, NSS volunteers served as control room workforce at Alappuzha Collectorate and NCC cadets rescued stranded people by ferry at Punnapra. Our college hosted a flood relief camp under the supervision of Kanjikkuzhy Grama Panchayath for 11 days, from 18th to 29th August, with a strength of 2000 campers from Nedumudy, Thakazhy and Pulinkunnu panchayaths of Kuttanad. All the staff, student groups and many former students extended their wholehearted support and rendered maximum help in the smooth running of the camp. Student volunteers from NSS, NCC and College Union were involved in the setting of the camp site, collection of dresses and bed sheets from nearby houses and distribution of relief materials to campers, waste management in the camp, celebration of onam by putting floral carpet with inmates, packing and distribution of Onam kits. They also operated College FM for relieving the

stress of campers, made arrangements to conduct medical camp, interacted with inmates and provided mental support, supplied crayons and colouring books to children and spent time with them by telling stories, post camp cleaning of the college premises. Our camp was highly appreciated by the three member UNICEF team, taking into account the cleanliness, quality of food served, security and waste management. Mr. Banku Bihari Sarkar commented that "This is one of the best relief camp that I have seen in my 20 years of professional career". Apart from hosting the relief camp, our student groups, NSS volunteers and NCC cadets were involved in rescue operations, procuring relief materials for camps run by the Revenue department. They also visited camps at Kuttanad and conducted ODK survey as part of "Kuttanadinoppam" program, served as resource persons of Suchithwa Mission to create awareness on cleanliness and waste management in camps at Cherthala and Alappuzha, served as supervisors of UNICEF to check the quality of back to home kits in packing centres of Alappuzha district and conducted assessment of flood damage in Thalavady gramapanchayath in connection with Rebuilt Kerala. The college has also responded to Salary Challenge in a positive manner and contributed generously towards the Chief Minister's Distress Relief Fund.
